- > THE PRACTICAL ARGUMENT (3:26-4:7)
 - ➤ In Christ they are one, as children of God, Abraham's seed, and heirs of the promise (3:26-29)
 - > Redeemed from the law, and adopted as sons, they are no longer slaves, but heirs (4:1-7)

- ➤ Galatians 3-4: PAUL'S DEFENSE OF THE GOSPEL OF JUSTIFICATION BY FAITH (3:1-4:31)
- > THE SENTIMENTAL ARGUMENT (4:8-20)
 - > His fears over their returning to bondage (4:8-11)
 - > Their past and present relationships to him (4:12-20)

- ➤ Galatians 3-4: PAUL'S DEFENSE OF THE GOSPEL OF JUSTIFICATION BY FAITH (3:1-4:31)
- > THE ALLEGORICAL ARGUMENT (4:21-31)
 - An allegory for those who desire to be under the Law (4:21-24a)
 - Symbolic of the two covenants; one from Mount Sinai which gives birth to bondage, and the other from the Jerusalem above which makes free (24b-31)
